Community Speedwatch

Are you interested in setting up Community Speedwatch in your village?

CSW is a scheme to help local residents take action against speeding traffic though their community. The scheme enables volunteers to work within their community to raise awareness of the dangers of speeding and to help control the problem locally - underpinning the community's commitment to reducing speeds.

Each CSW scheme runs over a full two-week period and involves volunteers taking direct action, using radar speed guns to identify individuals travelling in excess of the speed limit by 10% + 2mph (36mph). The use of the radar devices does not lead to prosecution, but drivers receive a warning letter from Leicestershire Police. Temporary CSW signage is also installed in areas taking part in CSW, to help raise awareness and extend the benefits of the scheme. The scheme is administered and co-ordinated by Rutland County Council in partnership with Local Police officers and Leicestershire Police. An optimum number of volunteers would be 12 or more to allow for rest periods, other commitments, and last-minute absences.

Local police officers will complete site surveys, so all speed checks are completed in safe areas and we go through a briefing and training session prior to commencement.

If your village is keen to have community speedwatch approach your councillor at a parish council meeting and they should be able to progress the request.

This month PC lcke has been out with road safety and community safety at Rutland County Council (Julie Potkins and Hugh Crouch) looking at suitable locations for the 5 villages that are going to be involved this year. Each village will be trained to use the newly funded SL700 camera (same as that used by the police) and will monitor traffic over a 2-week period. Any offending vehicles and the registered keepers will be sent advisory letters re their speed. The dates are:
