5<sup>th</sup> – Empingham Burglary dwelling where car is stolen.  
25<sup>th</sup> Lyddington – attempt break damage to window found.  
26<sup>th</sup> Ketton – Person arrested for going equipped to Burgle.

## VEHICLE CRIME

17<sup>th</sup> - B672 - Theft of damaged motor bike from side of the Road

We have had 3 domestic related burglaries, please remain vigilant, insure doors and windows are always locked and leave lights on if you go out. Rural locations and Farms are often targeted as their plant equipment are highly desired commodities due to demand exceeding worldwide supply. We are running operation Vitality for rural crime with extra officers out patrolling.

If you see witness or suspect anything similar happening, please call the police. Your call may be all that's required to catch them in the act!

The Community Speed Watch groups have now been decided and will continue again in April. In the meantime officers will still be out with the speed gun monitoring motorists. If you are caught expect your vehicle to be stopped at the roadside and the driver reported for the offence of Exceeding the Speed limit.


Speeding is one of the **"Fatal 4"** causes of death during a collision.

1. Driver distractions (mobile phones etc.)
2. Inappropriate speed.
3. Lack of seatbelt.
4. Alcohol or drug Impairment.

## Darker Nights



Burglars will use a variety of ways to avoid being noticed.

They don't want to be seen or heard by a neighbour or passer-by because they will feel exposed and identifiable.

Distraction burglars will pretend to be someone they are not, so it's important you are aware of the common methods they will use to get you to let them into your property.

Here's some useful advice, firstly on helping to keep burglars out by giving them no hiding place and, secondly, on how to prevent a distraction burglary.

## Keep it visible

You'd think that it would be best to make a property less visible from the street, and to keep it hidden from prying eyes behind overgrown bushes, trees, high fences or walls. In reality, all that this serves to do is make it easier for a burglar to get close to a home unnoticed, and provide somewhere to hide while carrying out a burglary or theft from the property.

1. Lower fences at the front around one-metre high are preferable to high fences as they allow for a clear view over the top and don't provide cover for anyone wishing to hide.
2. At the rear and sides, taller fencing is recommended to prevent easy access.
3. Trellis, thorny plants, or a suitable anti-climb topping such as plastic spikes make it difficult for anyone climbing over a fence or gate.
4. Planting prickly or barbed shrubbery along boundaries and fence lines acts as an effective natural barrier.
5. Gravel driveways and paths will make sure you hear anyone approach.

## DISTRACTION BURGLARY

Distraction burglars pretend to be someone they are not in order to gain entry to your home.

## Common methods used by distraction burglars

- pretending to be from a care agency, the council or a utility company investigating a gas or water leak
- seeking help to leave a note for a neighbour or even asking for a drink of water if they claim to be thirsty or unwell
- claiming to be in a hurry or emergency and needing to get into your home quickly
- working in teams, with one person distracting you while the other searches your home
- 

## How to prevent it

There are a number of things you can do to prevent distraction burglary. Always remember "if in doubt, keep them out":

- use your door viewer to see who's there
- if you open the door put the chain on first
- always ask for ID and check it with the company before letting somebody into your home
- use the phone number advertised in the phone book or online, as the number on their identity card could be fake. For a utility company, call the customer service department. Close the door while you do this
- remember that genuine callers won't mind checks. If you feel at all unsure, schedule a time for the caller to come back when a friend or relative is there
- for pre-planned appointments with utility companies, a password scheme can be set up
